

Circuit News November 2025



November is a month marked by remembering. It begins with All Saints and All Souls Days and moves swiftly to Remembrance Sunday. It give us opportunities to reflect deeply on the fellowship we enjoy with those who have gone before us, who have been examples to us and inspired us by their lives. When I began my ministry 35 years ago we were still burying very elderly First Word War veterans who fought in cavalry regiments on the battlefields of France and Belgium, men who had fought with horses and artillery on the battlefields. The threats by dictators and power-hungry oppressors is still prevalent in our world today. My son serves in the Royal Corps of Signals and spent some time training recently with other European forces in Estonia observing what the Russians were doing. As he did so I could not help but think that over 70 years ago this is exactly what my dad was doing in a different way, during his period of National Service serving with the East Yorkshire Regiment of the British Army in Graz, Austria, at the border with Czechoslovakia (as it was then); both in very different ways with unbelievably different kit but at the NATO border of the Western world. Personalities change but the issues seems not to have changed much in all that time.

We live in a fractured world and the Church of God must continue to play its part in this work of standing for justice, freedom, peace and the healing of all that divides us. Recently King Charles made a State visit to the Vatican and prayed with Pope Leo in a public service; King Charles as Supreme Governor of the Church of England and Pope Leo as leader of the RC Church. The distrust between these two ecclesial communities goes back a long way, nearly five hundred years to 1534 when Henry V111 broke with Rome. Of course, there are many issues that still divide (eg the place of women in ordained ministry and views about same-sex marriage) but since the 1960's we have fared better at working together generally between the denominations in

an ecumenical spirit. Praying together seemed not to provoke a lot of negative reaction as the idea did when it was first mooted and shelved some years ago. That, in itself, is a sign of the progress that has been made. Behind the scenes years of painstaking ecumenical engagement has been at work. We celebrate diversity whilst not expecting uniformity nowadays. Talking of ecumenism, 22 years ago this week, in the presence of HM Queen Elizabeth 11, representatives of the Methodist Church and Church of England signed an Anglican-Methodist Covenant seeking fuller visible and organic unity and the removal of all remaining obstacles. What this has meant in practice remains debatable, it feels more an aspiration rather than a rich harvest of progress has been manifest. Each denomination tends to largely do its own thing. We tend to make our own decisions, as if we lived in a vacuum. However, the word ecumenical means "the whole inhabited earth" and this reminds us that the agenda is large and wide, not small and narrow. Christian unity is but a sign of God's desire for unity amongst all peoples of the world. We also rejoice at the peace in the Middle East but we need to keep praying that the peace will hold. Meanwhile in domestic politics the issues of immigration keep coming to the fore. Our own people seem to hold varying views of what being British means.

Hebrews chapter 12 speaks of being "surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses", these are those who have gone before us on the journey of faith and those who surround us now by their prayers and fellowship who encourage us in our discipleship. In coming

Formby's Unknown Hero


